ARMY MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

The following are the papers set for the candidates for medical service in the Army, at the examination held at Chelsea Hospital on Monday and Tuesday, August 12th and 13th:—

ANATOMY AND PHYSIOLOGY.—Mr. BUSK.

1. Describe the origin, course, distribution, connexions, and function of the spinal accessory nerve and its branches.
2. Describe the arch of the aorta, and its relations; mention the vessels arising from it; and enumerate the more usual deviations from the normal disposition, to which they are subject in their origin.
3. Give the structure and relations of the membranous portion of the urethra.
4. Describe the minute structure of the walls of the larger and smaller arteries, veins, lymphatic vessels, and capillaries.
5. Point out the distinctions between the male and female adult osseous pelvis, and give the average dimensions of each outlet in the two sexes.
6. Enumerate the transparent parts of the eye; describe the form, structure, and relations of each, and the mode in which the visual image is formed on the retina.
7. Mention the conditions under which the amount of carbonic acid given off from the lungs is increased or diminished.

SURGERY.—Mr. POLLOCK.

1. Describe the symptoms of a case of ruptured kidney, the treatment to be pursued, and the results that may ensue upon such an injury.
2. What are the usual forms of hernia in children, male and female? Describe the difference between a congenital and infantile hernia.
3. Describe the treatment to be pursued in a case of punctured wound with copious arterial hæmorrhage in the palm of the hand.
4. Describe the symptoms of popliteal aneurism, and the treatment to be pursued.
5. Describe the symptoms of a case of pyæmia after amputation of a limb, and the pathological conditions found after death; and the external circumstances under which it is most likely to occur.

MEDICINE.—Dr. PARKES.

1. Enumerate the diseases giving rise to coma, and name the chief symptoms, in addition to the coma, which would be present in each case.
2. What are the chief structural lesions which may occur in the nervous tissue of the brain and cord, and what symptoms may they produce?
3. How would you diagnose and treat a case of great hypertrophy of the left ventricle of the heart, and what would have been the most likely causes of such a condition?
4. A person comes to you complaining of very severe pain in the right side, which has come on suddenly, and is attended with considerable dyspnoea. What might be the causes of such a condition, and how would you examine the patient with a view to determine the cause?
5. What are the preparations of iodine and of bromine in the British Pharmacopœia? What are their doses, how are they presumed to act, and in what diseases are they most commonly employed?
6. Trace the successive events in the case of a normal delivery at full time. What would you do in the case of flooding after delivery, before the placenta has come away, and afterwards?
